Preface

GOALS

To Build Faith: Knowledge of God's Word (Bible) builds up our faith that directs our spiritual walk [Rom.10:17]. Three times in the Bible we read, "the just shall live by faith" [Rom.1:17, Gal.3:11, Heb.10:38]. Faith provides direction to our lives [Psa.119:105]. When we need help, we are able to go to the Bible because we have learned to rightly divide the truth [2Ti.2:15].

To Become Established in God's Word (Bible): God wants us to become so established that we are not tossed around with every wind (spirit) of doctrine [Eph.4:14]. Being rooted in Biblical scripture, we are able to apprehend (grasp with the understanding) the fullness of God's truth. Through God's Word (Bible), Jesus sanctifies and cleanses us with a washing process [Eph.5:26].

To Run a Race of Faith: Oh that we might have a desire to know Jesus [Phi. 3:10-14] and run the race of faith!

BIBLE SCRIPTURE REFERENCE

All Biblical scripture references in this study book are taken from the King James Version. If any other translation is used, it will be shown following the Biblical scripture reference; e.g., Revised Version (RV), American Standard Version (ASV), etc.

The Bible contains • the mind of God, • the state of man, • the way of salvation, and • the happiness of believers. The Bible's doctrines are holy, its precepts binding, and its histories true. The Bible contains light to direct you, spiritual food to support you, and comfort to cheer you. Jesus is the grand subject of the Bible. God's Word (Bible) was designed for our good and the results are to the glory of God. Biblical scriptures should fill your memory, rule your heart, and guide your feet. Read the Bible slowly, frequently, and prayerfully. Biblical knowledge involves the highest responsibility. It rewards the greatest labor and condemns all who trifle with the Bible's sacred contents.

SUGGESTIONS TO STUDENTS

Do not try to master the Bible all at once or become upset if you do not understand what you have read. Biblical scriptures are revealed "precept upon precept: line upon line; here a little, and there a little" [Isa.28:10].

Read the lesson through at one sitting if possible, but do not hurry over it. Read it slowly and give it a chance to grip your heart and mind. As you read, ask God to give you something special from His Word. Stay in the lesson; do not skip around in the Bible. You are spending your time to gain knowledge of God's Word (Bible); learn to spend this time wisely.

There is no shortcut to getting Biblical knowledge; it is obtained through prayer, study, and meditation. We suggest that you get all you can directly from the Bible before consulting notes written by someone else. The Holy Spirit (God's gift) inspired the Word of God (Bible) and was given for the specific purpose of guiding us into all truth [Eph.1:17-18].

"Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth: for he shall not speak of himself; but whatsoever he shall hear, that shall he speak: and he will shew you things to come."

Always read the lesson through at least once, more if possible. Observe the instructions given in the Bible concerning reading God's Word [1Ti.4:13, Eph.3:4].

PREPARING TO STUDY

When we study, our attitude is very important, "And if any man think that he knoweth any thing, he knoweth nothing yet as he ought to know..." [1Co.8:2].

Meditate on God's Word (Bible). Note the promise given to the man who meditates on Biblical scriptures day and night, "He is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither. Whatever he does prospers" [Psa.1:1-3].

Take Biblical scripture at face value. Do not try to make it prove a point. Keep in mind that the Bible is the "inspired word of God." There is a promise to those who read, hear, and keep Biblical scriptures, but a curse is pronounced on those who add to them.

THE NAME OF GOD IS PLURAL

In the Genesis 1-2, the Hebrew word for God is **ELOHIM**; and, it occurs 2,500 times in the Old Testament.

Definition —	Elohim	Elohim, ordinarily translated "God" [Gen.1:1] is the most frequently used name in the Old Testament, as its equivalent theos, is in the New Testament, occurring in Genesis alone approximately 200 times. (1) Its form is plural, but the construction is uniformly singular, i.e. it governs a singular verb or adjective. It is characteristic of Hebrew that extension, magnitude and dignity, as well as actual multiplicity, are expressed by the plural. Historic Hebrew is unquestionably and uniformly monotheistic. [INTERNATIONAL NATIONAL BIBLE ENCYCLOPEDIA]

How unreasonable and impossible then, the teaching that the different functions of the 3 persons of the Godhead should be different manifestations of 1 person. In addition, that 1 person is Jesus Christ whom they call God. It destroys the Fatherhood of God, the eternal sonship of Jesus Christ, and the function of the Holy Spirit. Nevertheless, how simple, beautiful, and perfect the Bible teaching that there are 3 persons in the Godhead, each fulfilling a distinct function. There is only 1 of the Godhead who took on human form—Jesus.

THE 9 MANIFESTATIONS (GIFTS) OF THE SPIRIT

The 9 manifestations (gifts) of the Spirit [1Co.12:4-11] are the direct channels for the operations of the Holy Spirit. Nowhere are they called the gifts of the Father or of the Son. Yet, men still foolishly insist that the Holy Spirit and the Father is Jesus.

HOW THEY ADDRESS OR SPEAK ABOUT EACH OTHER

How they address each other, or speak about the each other, is a further proof of the Trine Godhead.

Adam and Eve ate of the fruit [Gen.3:6].

In 1 Timothy 2:14, we read that their act was called "the transgression."

Man's fallen nature always refers to the **old creation**; also called the **old man**.

The first recorded sin of man's fallen nature is being afraid (fear); it is the sin of unbelief and it bring forth deceitfulness. Anger is then the natural sequence which leads to murder that is accomplished by lying. All this results in the life of a vagabond and reaches its climax in complete wickedness.

The overall sin of man's fallen nature is **disobedience** to God's will or commandment.

"Hast thou eaten of the tree, whereof I commanded thee that thou shouldest not eat?"

Gen.3:11

Note

In the Hebrew, the word <u>imagination</u> in Gen.6:5, signifies not only the imagination, but also "purposes and desires."

The heart, as described in Genesis 6:5, represents the life of the old creation (our fallen nature) which has become corrupt.

"The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?"

Jer.17:9

The Word of God divides spirit, soul, and body. We cannot but by the Spirit of God learn to discern Scripture.

JESUS CHRIST'S INDICTMENTS

Jesus recounts 13 indictments in Mark 7:21-23. These evils come from the heart.

THE APOSTLE PAUL'S INDICTMENTS

There are 17 indictments given in Galatians 5:19-21; often referred to as "works of the flesh." Works of the flesh are outward manifestations of the old creation. Here the Apostle Paul teaches that no one can be saved by keeping The Law.

In Romans 1:29-32, we see 24 more indictments. These prove the world's absolute need of righteousness.

Another 16 indictments are listed in Romans 3:9-18.

All these indictments prove the world's absolute need of righteousness and clearly show that whether you are a Jew or Gentile, you are included! Here the Apostle Paul teaches that no one can be saved by keeping The Law.

FINAL DOOM OF FALLEN MAN, LAKE OF FIRE

The duration of the lake of fire doom lasts "day and night forever and ever"; it is eternal [Rev.20:10]. In Genesis, we saw that man's fall began with fear (being afraid) and in Revelation it ends with "the fearful" [Rev.21:8].

- · Everlasting destruction [2Th.1:8-9],
- everlasting punishment [Mat.25:46], and
- · resurrection of damnation [Joh.5:29].

The old creation is found to be completely bad. There are 89 indictments against the old creation. There are others, as the Apostle Paul says, that are not mentioned.

We quit our meanness because something was put in us and not because something was taken out of us. It is Christ in us. Let us teach it!

Redemption was announced early; actually, right after the fall of man [Gen.3:15].

REDEMPTION FORESHADOWED

We see redemption foreshadowed by this statement in Genesis 3:21 that "the LORD God make coats of skins, and clothed them." We also see man's futile efforts in the fact that "they sewed fig leaves together, and made themselves aprons" [Gen.3:7]. Fig leaves had to be replaced when they wilted; the coat of skins would last much longer but would still have to be replaced.

There were many sacrifices made of many animals in the Old Testament. The **one sacrifice**, Jesus Christ, meet **all** The Law's demands and provided redemption for **all** mankind; therefore, no further sacrifices were needed.

Atonement is also a theological term that stands for the whole sacrificial and redemptive work of Christ.

Doctrinal Points 1

"Atonement makes amends, or satisfaction, for wrong or injury; something done or suffered by way of reparation" [WILSON'S DICTIONARY].

Atonement implies that 2 parties cannot come to an agreement about something; therefore, something is needed to bring parties together. Atonement accomplishes the appearement of the wrath of the offended party [Gen.32:20, Eze.16:63] by bearing the penalty due the offender.

Redemption Typified

THE PASSOVER [Exo.12:1-30]

DEFINITION —	Abib	The first month of the ecclesiastical year of the Hebrews; afterwards called Nisan. It answers nearly to our April. It was so named, because grain, particularly barley, was in ear at that time of the year. Abib carries the meaning of "green fruit" or "ears of corn."
	Passover	Comes from the Hebrew word PACACH meaning "to pass" or "spring over" or "to spare"; another meaning is "thy broken piece."

Passover was first held in the month of Abib [Exo.13:4]. This month was also called Nisan after a Babylonian god. This is the first month of the Jewish sacred year. Later, they imitated the nations and made the beginning in the Fall (the Hebrews civil year). Because of the changes of the moon, the day of the Passover is changeable.

The Passover is an annual Hebrew festival on the evening of the 14th day of the month Abhibh (Abib, or Nisan, as it was called in later times). It was followed by, and closely connected with, a 7 days' festival of Matstsoth (Feast of Unleavened Bread).

The sacrificial lamb had to be without blemish and 1 year old. It referred to the "Messiah" because there was no moral, intellectual, or physical blemish in Jesus Christ. He was perfect in every way, innocent and full grown. On the 10th day of the month, the lamb was taken and kept under inspection for almost 4 days. The 10 days figure the period of Jesus Christ's life when He lived in seclusion before His Father, and the 4 days point to His public ministry in which He proved Himself to be without spot.

God saw only one lamb; called "IT" [Exo.12:6]. The lamb was the Passover [Exo.12:11].

- The blood was a token of safety.
- The "roasting with fire" speaks of Jesus Christ's atoning death.
- The "unleavened bread" speaks of His holy humanity
- The "bitter herbs" of the bitterness of His sufferings.

Doctrinal Points 1

To eat of the offering raw would imply that Jesus died as a martyr and not as our substitute. Unity and Christian Science eat Him **raw** because they reject His atoning death. The offerings boiled in water would imply that the intense heat would be modified, as if Jesus Christ did not suffer the severe, full judgment of God. There would also be less food value than in the roasted meat.

When Jesus Christ died, we also died with Him (spirit, soul, and body). When He arose as a new creation, we also came up with Him in resurrection.

"Let nothing of it remain" [Exo.12:10] means to appropriate Christ, not only what you like of Him, but the whole Christ in His fullness, every day, and in every circumstance. Do not leave any remainders. Burn them with fire. If any of the offering should be left over until the next day, it might spoil; and God would have nothing that represents His Son to be imperfect (spoiled).

Only the men who were circumcised could eat of the Passover.

Definition — circumcision cutting off

Circumcision speaks of the death of the old creation. All the firstborn of Egypt died. However, Israel's firstborn died only in their substitute, the lamb.

HEALING AT MARAH [Exo. 15:23-27]

Jesus Christ, the tree, was cast into the bitter waters of this world. He sweetened the bitterness for humanity through His substitutionary death. He was made a curse for us, to deliver us from the curse [Gal.3:13-14]. The crucifixion was foreshadowed in Deuteronomy 21:22-23. God is the gracious Healer of all human ills—**Jehovah-rapha**.

SERPENT ON THE POLE [NUM.21:6-9]

DEFINITION — **pole**The Hebrew word **NACAC** means "to be conspicuous as a signal, to raise a beacon, lift up as an ensign (sign, banner, cross)."

The serpent bit the children of Israel because they murmured, therefore they became bitter, poisoned by sin. Jesus Christ became the serpent lifted up on a pole (cross) to deliver us from the serpent's bite [2Co.5:21]. To some people the cross is only an idol.

THE SCAPEGOAT [LEV.16]

Christ is the scapegoat.

Every year, it took 2 goats to carry away the sins of Israel for 1 year:

- · One scapegoat represents Jesus Christ dying for us, and
- the other one speaks of Him casting our sins into the sea of forgetfulness.

Both goats are implied in Hebrews 9:12-14.

Justification is imputed to us. Regeneration is imparted to us. Regeneration is a change of nature, a recreation."

Regeneration, or the "new birth," is another phase of man's side of redemption (the practical side).

The word "regeneration" occurs twice: Mat.19:28 and Tiu.3:5.

The words **begotten** and **born** come from 1 Greek word **GENNAO**. [Mat.1:16; Luk.1:13-14, 35, 57]. **GENNAO** means to "procreate" (properly, of the father, but by extension of the mother); figuratively, "to regenerate." When referring to the father, it means "to beget"; when referring to the mother, it means "to bear, to bring forth" [Mat.1:16].

It is translated "born" in Joh.3:3, 7 and "begotten" in 1Pe.1:3 (if to be begotten means only conviction, then Peter was not begotten unto a living hope; but was only convicted about it).

Another application of **Gennao** is that "begotten" refers to Jesus' resurrection in Psa.2:7, Act.13:33, and Heb.1:5.

JUSTIFICATION gives the sinner, who believes, A **NEW STANDING**. The **NEW BIRTH** gives him a **NEW NATURE**. The former is **IMPUTED** righteousness, and we are **counted holy**. The latter is **IMPARTED** righteousness, and we are **made holy**. The former reckons us **INNOCENT**, and makes us citizens of God's kingdom. The latter makes us **CHILDREN** and heirs in God's family. **JUSTIFICATION** changes our **POSITION**. **REGENERATION** changes our **NATURE**. Both change our relationship to God. The former makes us **ACCEPTED** in Christ. The latter makes us **ALIVE** in Christ. The former puts **US INTO CHRIST**, the last Adam. The latter puts **CHRIST IN US**."

Sanctification

Another very important phase of redemption is **sanctification**.

Definition —	sanctification	to make holy, i.e. (ceremonially) purify or consecrate; (mentally) to venerate: hallow, be holy, separation, consecration, and setting apart.
		Synonym: Holiness [Rom.6:19, 22; Heb.12:14].

The first mention of sanctification is in Genesis 2:

"And God blessed the seventh day, and **SANCTIFIED IT**: because that in it he had rested from all his work which God created and made."

Gen.2:3

Our hearts are bubble over with joy and gratitude to the triune God, who made a perfect provision for our sanctification long before the foundation of the world was laid. Our sanctification by the will of God means that God, in His provision, set apart those who would believe [Heb.10:10 RV]. He also supplies every present need for our practical sanctification, even today.

The same Holy Spirit, through whom we were chosen, is our empowerment. The same Holy Son of God, through whose death we were sanctified, is now our life. He becomes our positive and constant sanctification.

Turn to Romans 6 ("the book of books") and earnestly and prayerfully study the best-tested recipe for deliverance from indwelling sin.

RELATIONSHIP TO JUSTIFICATION, NEW BIRTH

Eternal life's relation to justification is found in Tiu.3:7 where it states that we are justified according to the hope of eternal life. Eternal life is also the culmination. The new birth is the beginning of our personal experience of eternal life. Justification is brought about the same way. Eternal life is an **infusion**; justification is our **judicial relationship** to God (a change from sinfulness or iniquity to righteousness). The new birth is a change of nature.

RELATIONSHIP TO THE NEW BIRTH

Eternal life's relation to the new birth is found in John 3:3, 5, 14-16. Our whole Christian experience is comprehended in the expression "eternal life." As to our spirit, we receive eternal life when we believe. We receive title to our inheritance in the gift of eternal life. Laying hold on eternal life refers to the results of salvation; bringing our state up to our standing [1Ti.6:12] which is perfected as we increase in Christ.

Jesus gives many positive statements concerning eternal life; to disbelieve them would be making Him a liar. His life is in the believer, and the believer is in the life.

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life."

Joh.5:24

There is no possibility of any believer being lost, because Christ will raise him up at the last day.

"And this is the will of him that sent me, that every one which seeth the Son, and believeth on him, may have everlasting life: and I will raise him up at the last day."

Joh.6:40

By eating the Bread of Life, he receives life that lives forever.

"This is that bread which came down from heaven: not as your fathers did eat manna, and are dead: he that eateth of this bread shall live forever." Joh.6:58

He cannot die (**spiritually**). If some say, you can pluck yourself out of God's hands. Does that not sound like conceit?

Do not blame us. Blame the Book of books for eternal life. The doctrine that fights eternal life is a reflection on God's love, His holiness, and His plan. It is terrible to believe that God would save a poor sinner, and then send him to hell. God has given us 2 immutable things as assurance:

- The **hope** set before us which is an anchor of the soul, and
- He confirmed it with an oath [Heb.6:13-20].

ENCOURAGES SPIRITUAL LAZINESS

The doctrine of eternal life encourages **laxity** and **spiritual laziness**. However, in Romans 5 we see the Apostle Paul's contradiction:

"17 For if by one man's offence death reigned by one; much more they which receive abundance of grace and of the gift of righteousness shall reign in life by one, Jesus Christ.) 18 Therefore as by the offence of one judgment came upon all men to condemnation; even so by the righteousness of one the free gift came upon all men unto justification of life. 19 For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous. 20 Moreover the law entered, that the offence might abound. But where sin abounded, grace did much more abound: 21 That as sin hath reigned unto death, even so might grace reign through righteousness unto eternal life by Jesus Christ our Lord."

Rom.5:17-21

ALLOWS PEOPLE TO DO AS THEY PLEASE

Eternal life doctrine **encourages people to do as they please**. The answer to this is that it encourages the **new man** to please the Lord; our **old man** was crucified with Christ. Looseness of conduct is not encouraged by the Lord Jesus Christ, or by the Apostle the Apostle Paul.

"1 What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? 2 God forbid. How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?"

Rom.6:1-2

We see, however, that Satan is the originator of such false charges.

DENIES SELF-JUDGMENT

The doctrine of eternal life **denies all self-judgment of** believers; therefore, there is no fear of God before their eyes.

We believe the Bible because the Holy Spirit witnesses to our spirit that it is the Word of God. The foretold prophecies have been, are, and will be fulfilled. It is the only book that gives us a revelation of God. It gives life to the believer.

WE ARE ADOPTED NOT BORN SONS

Not one of these, nor any other Scripture, teaches that we get into God's family by adoption.

DEFINITION — **adoption** The Greek word translated <u>adoption</u> means "sonship" or "the placing as a son."

ONCE IN GRACE, ALWAYS IN GRACE

This is not a Scriptural expression; therefore, we do not teach it.

Who fell from grace? The legalists:

"Christ is become of no effect unto you, whosoever of you are justified by the law; ye are fallen from grace."

Gal. 5:4

There may be a variety of meanings for the word **grace**. Some use the word **grace** for being saved. Why not rather use Scriptural terms like "born again" and "saved"?

PERISH IF HAVEN'T ENDURED TO THE END

Some get saved but then they **THINK** that they will **perish if they do not endure to the end**.

Matthew 24:13 refers to enduring to the end of The Tribulation, but not to the end of life. They are saved from death. This does not refer to our soul's salvation. Man's soul is saved by faith not by endurance. A physical deliverance from death is the meaning.

Crucifixion of Christ

Knowledge of the Scriptural meaning of the crucifixion of Christ is our main purpose. Jesus did not die as a martyr for His cause, but He died the meritorious death of a substitute for sin.

ON WHAT DAY WAS CHRIST RAISED?

Christ was raised on the 1st day of the week. However, Matthew 28:1 seems to contradict this: "*In the end of the Sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to see the sepulcher.*" From this verse, the Adventists try to prove that Christ arose on Saturday.

Christ was raised on the 3rd day of His interment.

Note

The Greek word **OPSE** means "in the end of"; it also means "late," "long after." "As it began to dawn" shows it was not in the end of the Sabbath, but long after it. The Diaglott and other translations say, "after the Sabbath, as it was dawning to the 1st day of the week."

CHRIST, THE FIRST FRUIT

Jeremiah 2:3 and James 1:18 show the wave sheaf was "of the first fruits" of the Jewish harvest. The wave sheaf typified Christ's resurrection [1Co.15:20]. Thus, in type, God accepted Jesus, His Son, as the first fruit of the resurrection and as Lord and Head of the new creation.

Compare another wave offering [Lev.23:15-21] with 1Co.12:13 "50 days after the former."

TIME COUNTING

Note

Notice the phrase "on the morrow after the Sabbath" [Lev.23:11]. Study "tomorrow" and "on the morrow" [Num.16:5, Num.22:41, Exo.9:6, Exo.18:13, Exo.32:6]. According to this type, Jesus rose after midnight.

According to Matthew 27, Jesus died in the 9th hour of the day, (3 p.m.).

PASSOVER PREPARATION

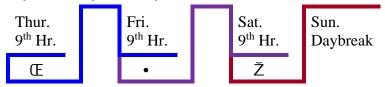
"*The preparation*" in John 19:31 was not an ordinary one for a regular weekly Sabbath, as Mark 15:42 and Luke 23:54 might suggest.

In John 19:14 "the preparation of the Passover" was a special preparation for a special feast. The high day, great day, was an extra Sabbath that came before the weekly Sabbath. The preparation day began Thursday at 6 p.m. Therefore, Christ was crucified Thursday, died at 3 p.m. (the 9th hour) and was buried by 6 p.m.

DEATH AND RESURRECTION DAY COUNTING

He was in the tomb 3 days:

- Day 1: The high-day Sabbath (Thursday),
- Day 2: The regular Sabbath (Friday), and
- Day 3: Saturday to Sunday or 1st day of the new week.



Jesus was not crucified on Friday. If He were, He was in the grave less than 36 hours. Jesus was not crucified on Wednesday, which would have left Him in the tomb 3½ days, a contradiction of plain statements. Some think Matthew 12:40 contradicts this statement.

He was in the heart of the earth 3 hours before His body was entombed.

THE LORD'S DAY OR DAY OF CHRIST

The 1st day of the week is not "the Lord's day" [Rev.1:10]. **The Lord's day** is also called "the day of Christ" [Phi.1:6 and 2Th.2:2] and "the day of the Lord" [Joe.1:15]. All of these phrases refer to the time of Christ's Kingdom reign during the Millennium. During the Millennium (Jesus Christ's 1,000-year reign) will be the Father's Sabbath, as typified by the rest mentioned in Genesis 2:2.

LESSON 49

Where are the Dead?

In the Bible, we find several words that refer to the "abode of the dead." This study looks into each of those "words."

THE OLD TESTAMENT

DEFINITION —	Sheol	expresses the abode of the dead.
		It comes from a root word that means "to make hollow."

Note

The Hebrew word **SHEOL** is sometimes incorrectly translated "**grave**" See scriptures: Gen.37:35, 1Sa.2:6, Job 14:13.

It is correctly translated "hell." See the Revised Version: Job 11:8; Psa.9:17; Psa.139:8; Pro.23:14; Amo.9:2.

Upper Sheol and Lower Sheol

Sheol comprises 2 compartments:

- Upper Sheol Upper Sheol is the abode of the righteous dead, was called "Abraham's Bosom" in Luke 16:23 and "Paradise" in Luke 23:43
- Lower (Lowest) Sheol Lower (Lowest) Sheol is the abode of the wicked dead.

The word <u>Tartarus</u> also agrees with it. Tartarus is only known in Hellenistic Jewish literature from the Greek text, dated to 400–200 B.C. It was referred to as a dark abyss, said to be as deep below <u>Hades</u> as the earth is below heaven. In classical texts, the longer form of the Greek word <u>KATA-TARTAROO</u> is often related to the throwing of the Titans and rebels against God down to Tartarus.

In 2 Peter 2:4 the word <u>hell</u> is used. It is the word <u>dungeons</u> in the margin of the Revised Version. It is <u>Tartarus</u> in the Greek translation.

THE NEW TESTAMENT

Besides the word <u>Tartarus</u>, we also see that the words <u>Hades</u> and <u>Gehenna</u>. Seven are translated hell.

• Hades answers to Lowest Sheol, being the present abode of the wicked dead.

Baptism in the Spirit Vs. Anointing with the Spirit

The **baptism** in the Spirit and the **anointing** with the Spirit are not the same.

- The Baptism was God's sovereign act. It occurred once for all. There is but "*one baptism*" [Eph.4:5].
- The Anointing with the Spirit is personal, and is received by faith in God's promise. The whole Church was **baptized** in the Spirit once, and all at one time; however, individuals receive the **anointing** as they believe for it.

Of these 5 instances, 2 of them have nothing to say about **speaking in tongues**. Tongues is **not the anointing**, it is only the **outward sign** that the person has indeed been filled with the Holy Spirit [1Co.14:22, Mar.16:17].

In 1 Corinthians 12 and 14, the Apostle Paul gives us the New Testament setting forth of the truth concerning tongues. There is a difference in speaking in tongues:

- At the **initial infilling**, tongues are for a sign. 1 Corinthians 12:10 refer to speaking in tongues as one of the 9 gifts of the Spirit. Some put undue stress on speaking in tongues, and others reject it.

We are not emphasizing tongues, but an entire yieldedness to God which includes yielding our "*unruly member*," the tongue, to God [Rom.6:13, 1Co.14:39-40].

THE BAPTISM AND THE ANOINTING

The **baptism** is the provision. The **anointing** is the appropriation.

The Apostle the Apostle Paul explains the nature, purpose, and extent, of that baptism:

"For in one Spirit were we all baptized into one body... and were all given (Greek) to drink."

1Co.12:13

Therefore, there is **ONE** body and **ONE** baptism [Eph.4:4-5]. After Pentecost, the believers acknowledged the **ONE** baptism.

THE NEW COVENANT

The **New Covenant** is in contrast with the Mosaic Covenant (old covenant of The Law). Though the Abrahamic Covenant is older than the Mosaic Covenant, yet it never gets old in quality. It always remains new.

This covenant is "new" only as compared with the Covenant of The Law (Mosaic Covenant) made with Israel; but not new as compared with the Abrahamic Covenant, or as referring to the Gentiles who are also blessed in the Abrahamic Covenant [Gen.12:2-3].

Note

Observe, that in Gal.3:16 that "thy seed" primarily refers to Christ. The repetitions only confirm (establish) it [Gen.15:18 and Gen.17:2-8].

The **New Covenant** is the renewal of the Abrahamic Covenant.

Definition —	Sabbath	The word <u>Sabbath</u> means "rest" [Lev.23:3, Heb.4:9-10] or "keeping of a Sabbath," (in the margin of Oxford Authorized Version).
		The Hebrew root word SHABHATH means "to desist, cease, rest."
	Decalogue	Decalogue is the name given by the Greek fathers to the 10 Commandments (or "the ten words" as the original is more literally rendered) [Exo.20:3-17]. These Commandments were at first written on 2 stone slabs [Exo.31:18]. The Decalogue is alluded to several times in the New Testament [Mat.5:17-19; Mar.10:19; Luk.18:20; Rom.7:7-8; Rom.13:9; 1Ti.1:9-10].

The first mention of the Sabbath is in Exodus 16:23, 29.

- One month after Israel left Egypt, manna fell, showing God's grace; then the Sabbath was instituted to be remembered.
- Another month later, The Law was given [Exo.20]. Up to that time, according to God's covenant with Abraham, Israel had been under grace [Gen.15:18, Gen.17:2]. To prove them

whether they would keep His Law, rather to teach them that they could not keep it [Act.15:10], God gave them the **Decalogue** (the 10 Commandments, The Law) [Gal.3:19].

God spoke the 10 Commandments to Moses from Sinai [Exo.20]. The holy Sabbath of rest was in the center as an effectual word of grace, shielding Israel from the slaying power of The Law.

THE TABERNACLE

After uttering The Law (the 10 Commandments), God called Moses up into the mount and gave him the pattern of the Tabernacle and its furnishings and the religious ritual; all of which was an expression of divine mediation because of grace, as seen in Exodus 24 to Exodus 31 and Galatians 3:19-20.

Moses was the **mediator**, a type of Christ.

The Mercy Seat with the **Decalogue** under it in The Ark of the Covenant was the loudest note of grace. Only as surrounded with mercy was The Law harmless. With the **Sabbath** in the middle between the duties to God and the duties to operate, as a hub of a great wheel, The Law was powerless to destroy.

The great wheel, called a schoolmaster [Gal.3:24-26], served its purpose (so did the hub—the Sabbath) until Christ came.

"Christ is the end of The Law for righteousness to everyone that believeth." Rom.10:4 Christ is our rest [Mat.11:28-30].

Hence, after Jesus arose, the disciples always met for worship on the 1st day of the week [Joh.20:19].

To whom do we pay tithe? Certainly, Abraham did not originate it because God taught him to tithe. Tithing was one of Abraham's "*steps of faith*" [Rom.4:12]. Tithing was introduced under grace not under The Law.

Nothing written in the Bible indicates that tithing was revoked. ... Tithing was instituted **before** the 10 Commandments were given.

Note

Tithes in their origin appear to have been an offering made unto God, and probably were something similar to the minchah, which we learn from Genesis 4 was in use almost from the foundation of the world. When God established a regular, and we may add an expensive worship, it was necessary that proper provision should be made for the support of those who were obliged to devote their whole time to it, and consequently were deprived of the opportunity of providing for themselves in any secular way. It was soon found that a tenth part of the produce of the whole land was necessary for this purpose, as a whole tribe, that of Levi, was devoted to the public service of God; and when the land was divided, this tribe received no inheritance among their brethren. Hence, for their support, the law of tithes was enacted; and by these the priests and Levites were not only supported as the ministers of God, but as the teachers and intercessors of the people, performing a great variety of religious duties for them which otherwise they themselves were bound to perform. As this mode of supporting the ministers of God was instituted by himself, so we may rest assured it was rational and just. Nothing can be more reasonable than to devote a portion of the earthly goods which we receive from the free mercy of God, to his own service

Sovereignty and Free Will

God created all things sovereignly. He planned a new creation sovereignly also. His process of production also is sovereign. No creature had a hand or voice in it. Man may only agree with God's process; that is, believe it and receive it. Man's will determines who enters. No one can evade Christ's "whosoever." God did not decree certain ones to be saved and others to be damned.

God sovereignly appoints His servants.

- · He chose Moses to lead and shepherd Israel.
- Jeremiah was called to be a prophet to Israel.
- Jesus chose, equipped, and sent 12 apostles to serve.

Study the gifts of Rom.12:6-8 and 1Co.12.

Nevertheless, those men were not dearer to Him because they were leaders. The sovereignty of God is expressed in predestination. Some Bible teachers make a mistake and put God's sovereignty into the sphere of human will. They destroy the liberty of men. It contradicts the "whosoever."

THREE GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- Stay by John 3:16 (as to experience of the sinner).
- Distinguish between predestination and foreknowledge.
- Distinguish between the call to salvation ("whosoever will") and the call to service (sovereign).

Imperial Government (Theocracy)

God ruled over Israel as His family for about 550 years (including their wilderness journey, Joshua's leadership, and the Judges [Act.13:20]). This type of government is referred to as a **theocracy** (also known as an **Imperial Government**) thus making God an autocrat.

DEFINITION —	theocracy	a form of government in which anyone (Devine or human) is the source from which all authority derives.
	Autocrat	anyone who rules with total power; one who has undisputed influence or power.
	democracy	a government in which the supreme power is vested in the people and exercised by them, directly or indirectly, involving periodically held free elections.

MAN'S RULE BEGAN

Man's rule began under Samuel when Israel clamored for a king in order to be like the other nations. Saul was man's choice [1Sa.8:5, 19-20; 1Sa. 9:17; Hos.13:11].

- · While Saul was reigning, David was in training [1Sa.].
- David reigned 40 years [2Sa., see 1Ki.2:11].
- Israel was divided into Israel and Judah.
- Solomon reigned in Jerusalem. Jeroboam reigned in Shechem in Samaria.
- · Israel taken captive in 720 B.C. [2Ki.17:5-6].
- Judah taken captive in 606 B.C. [2Ki.24:11-14].

World Dominion Given to the Gentiles

In 606 B.C., the Jewish dynasty was dissolved and world dominion given to Nebuchadnezzar when he took the last 2 tribes of Israel (Judah) into captivity.

In 720 B.C. Israel (the 10 tribes) were taken captive to Assyria [2Ki.17:5-6, 2Ki.24:11-14, Jer.25:9-11, Jer.27:3-6, Jer.28:14, Dan.1:1-2, Luk.21:24 (compare Hos.3:4-5)].

THE KINGDOM OF CHRIST

Christ's Kingdom

- The kingdom introduced. by John the Baptist and later Jesus Christ [Mat.3:1-2, Mat.4:17].
- The kingdom expressed by parables [Mat.13 (note Verse 11)].
- The King of this kingdom was rejected and crucified.
- Emphasized by the slaying of Stephen [Act.7:57-59].
- It was confirmed by refusing the Apostle Paul's message [Act.13:46].
- A parenthetical plan, Christ's Church (with relation to Israel) [Mat.16:18].
- The Kingdom and The Church are blended. The mystery is revealed [Eph.3:1-16].
- The Kingdom is within [Luk.17:21, Rom.14:17].
- It culminates with the "Heavenly Kingdom." [2Ti.4:18]
- Peter's interpretation of The Kingdom. [1Pe.2:1-9]. This is partly applicable today, but will be fully fulfilled later.

Doctrinal Points 1

- The kingdom of the heavens (the kingdom of God): God's dominion in heaven and earth (Matthew—of Heavens; Mark & Luke—of God).

LESSON 58

Dominions, Matthew 13 Parables

Definition —	parable	a simple story used to illustrate a moral or spiritual lesson; a fictitious, true/untrue, narrative true to human nature; a comparison of 2 things through a story that has dual meanings and is always attributed to humans.
	allegory	a story, poem, or picture that can be interpreted to reveal a hidden meaning, typically moral or political.
	fable	a short story told always using animals, not humans, as examples.

Matthew 13 is the parable chapter of the New Testament. The 7 parables of this chapter are called "the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven."

The multitude of people did not have a revelation of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven; therefore, Jesus had to present it to them in parables in such a way that they were able to understand it. In Matthew, the phrase "the kingdom of heaven" agrees with "the kingdom of God" in the Gospels of Mark and Luke. They both mean God's universal dominion.

Note

Amos also speaks of different spheres in heaven [Amo.9:6]. They are called "stories," "steps" (Isaac Lesser), and "chambers" (Revised Version).

It embraces Christ's Church now, and "His heavenly kingdom" [2Ti.4:18], Christ's Millennial Kingdom, and the "kingdom" of the "Father" [Mat.13:43, 1Co.15:24-28].

The **first 4 parables** of Matthew 13 were spoken to the multitude. The Jews had rejected Christ; hence, He turned, as it were, to the Gentiles.

The **next 3 parables** were spoken in a house [Mat.13:36]. Jesus sent the multitude away and went into a house, where he spoke to His disciples (Israel).

Dispensationally

The parables have some correspondence dispensationally with the different Church periods in Revelation 2 and Revelation 3.

PARABLE 1 — THE SOWER [MAT.13:3-23]

	Reference(s)
The "Sower" is "the Son of Man."	Mat.13:3, 37

In the Greek, "the SOWER" and "that which he had SOWN", come from the same Greek word SPEIRO meaning "to sow seed".

1ST **HEARERS**: Although the seed is sown in the hearts of the **wayside hearers** [Mat.13:19], yet the ground is not broken up with conviction; it is not mixed into the soil by faith. The seed is only lying loosely on the surface; therefore, Satan picks it up.

2ND HEARERS: There is no complete conviction in the **stony ground hearers**, no broken spirit. They endure for a while, join a church, and are apparent believers; often leaving their belief behind because of a hard trial or difficult relationship.

Note: The first 2 kinds of hearers are not saved.

3RD **HEARERS**: Thorny hearers, are saved, but not entirely fruitful [Luk.8:14]. The 3 thorns: ŒCares,

• riches, and Ž pleasure hinder these hearers.

Reference(s)
Luk.8:18 explains Mat.13:12

Those that have an open heart for the Truth shall receive more truth. However, "whosoever hath not" (means one that "seems to have" or who makes a profession only without possession) from him will be taken away the opportunity and privilege of hearing the Truth.

4TH HEARERS: **Good ground hearers**, are saved and fruitful. Matthew 13:23 speaks of 3 degrees of fruitfulness in believers:

"But he that **RECEIVED** seed into the good ground is he that heareth the word, and **UNDERSTANDETH** it; which also **BEARETH FRUIT**, and bringeth forth, some an hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty."

Mat.13:23

The hundredfold fruit bearers are the full overcomers.

Dispensationally

This parable refers to the beginning of The Church, which was Ephesian in character.

PARABLE 2 — WHEAT & TARES [MAT. 13:24-30, 36-43]

Matthew 13:24-25, 38 describes 2 kinds of seeds: Wheat and tares.

Wheat stems and tare stems look alike; they can only be distinguished when the wheat is ripe. In addition, tares entwine around the wheat stalks. The tares figure religious sinners (compare Joh.8:44). For such there is no salvation.

There will be an end to "sorrows" [Mat.13:8]. In Matthew 24:3, the word end...from the Greek word CHRONOS ("a space of time", "a fixed occasion") references a period of time that is coming to an end...the end of an age. At the end of the Church Age, there will be a separation of the true and the false. However, the final fulfillment of this parable will come at the end of the Millennial Age.

"For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom: and there shall be earthquakes in divers places, and there shall be famines and troubles: these are the beginnings of *sorrows* { **Gr. pains of woman in birth travail**}."

Mar.13:8

"All these are the beginning of *sorrows* { **Gr. grief**}."

Mat.24:8

"Children of wrath" may get saved but their fleshly desires lead them astray (picture of the Ephesian saints).

"Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience: Among whom also we all had our conversation in times past in the lusts of our flesh, fulfilling the desires **{Gr. wills}** of the flesh and of the mind; and were **BY NATURE THE CHILDREN OF WRATH**, even as others."

Eph.2:2-3

The phrase <u>end of the world</u> [Mat.13:39] is literally translated, "*consummation of <u>THE AGE</u>*." However, the word <u>age</u> here does not refer to the Church Age, but to the Millennial Age. After Christ's Millennial reign, all things will be subjected unto His Father, and the Father will be the sole ruler of the whole universe—His will be all in all.

The "furnace of fire" [Mat.13:42] (see Mat.24:41, 46) corresponds to the lake of fire [Rev.20:14].

Dispensationally
The church of Smyrna answers to the 2 nd parable.

PARABLE 3 — THE MUSTARD SEED [MAT.13:31-32]

The **herb** becoming a "*tree*" indicates an unusual growth, and figures the enormity of Christendom. A tree has a trunk, great limbs, smaller limbs, and still smaller limbs, and twigs. The **trunk** figures the organization of the professed church, the **limbs** the religious leaders.

The **oneness of the tree** figures the hidden union of the Catholic and Protestant churches as they are merging today. By domineering over others, how unlike the wheat (which has no "big heads") they are. All have about the same height and size.

Birds (representing demons) lodge in the tree.

Dispensationally

The church of Pergamos (married to the world, dwelling on earth where Satan's seat is, and endorsing evil doctrine) answers to this parable.

PARABLE 4 — LEAVEN IN MEAL [MAT. 13:33]

Leaven represents evil. We see this in...

- the self-righteous evil doctrine and hypocrisy of the Pharisees;
- the doctrine of the Sadducees who did not believe in angels, or spirits, or resurrection of the dead; also malice, wickedness, and
- Herod's national dominion.

Note

Study Mat.16:6, Mar.8:15, Luk.12:1, and 1Co.5:6-8.

The false church is figured by the "woman" [Rev.2:20, Rev.17:1-2, Rev.19:2].

The **meal** represents God's Word (the Bible).

The 3 measures represent the Trinity, the basic doctrine of the Bible. The Catholic Church claims to be the teacher of Scripture. She has leavened the truth with legality, self-righteousness, hypocrisy, man-rule, and sectarianism. Protestants have copied her teachings [Rev.2:15, 19-20]

Dispensationally

The church in Thyatira answers to this parable. Observe how Satan appears in each parable: as fowls devouring seed, himself sowing tares, demons lodging, his doctrines disseminating.

Note the decline of Christendom.

- **Ephesus** opposed error (by God's Word [the Bible]);
- **Smyrna**, the wheat, died for the Truth;
- **Pergamos**, the mustard seed, never dies but grows and allows error to be taught;
- Thyatira, the woman, teaches error and corrupts all.

Psalm 78:2 is fulfilled by these parables.

Compare Eph.3:9.

PARABLE 8 — INSOLVENCY [MAT. 18:22-35]

DEFINITION — **insolvency** state of being unable to pay all debts.

This parable portrays God's limitless forgiveness.

- Redemption is the ground for it.
- Grace is the provisional cause with the blood being the procuring price.
- The Holy Spirit is the active agent of redemption.
- Faith is the condition, or connecting link.

Dominions, Other Parables 14-16

PARABLE 14 — THE TALENTS [MAT.25:14-30]

The **traveler** represents the Lord Jesus. The **traveler's servants** are the Lord Jesus' ministers.

The goods or **talents** (money), which he distributed according to their "several ability," is the Word of God (Bible) with its accompanying gifts and responsibilities.

Even though the 1st and 2nd servants received different amounts of money, they each made a 100% profit. If we use our gifts and opportunities faithfully according to our abilities, we may derive the same percentage as a result.

The faithful servants gained a 4-fold reward (100% more), praise, the promise of ruler ship, and the glorious hope of entering into the joy of the Lord.

Note

The value of a talent was approximately \$1,500.

The indolent servant was without excuse. Nothing is too small or unimportant to be used. Everything we have belongs to God. We can use it for His glory and return it to Him. To hide the talent in the earth, speaks of misuse in earthly investments, or sowing to the flesh. There are great losses for the indolent:

- · No gain, the only gift taken away.
- Instead of praise, he received rebuke.
- Outer darkness is his destiny. How sad!

The owner also suffered loss. God and men are profited by spiritual investments.

This parable speaks primarily of service. The principle is to put to use what the Lord gives. Faithfulness is a praiseworthy trait. Faithfulness, full of faith, makes us fit for service. It would be unwise of the Lord to put a heavier burden of service upon us than we are able to bear.

Dispensationally

Dispensationally the traveler's servants refer to the nation of Israel.

PARABLE 15 — THE POUNDS [LUK.19:11-27]

The **nobleman** is the Lord Jesus Christ. His going "*into a far country*" speaks of His entering into heaven during this Church Age, and receiving His kingdom before His return.

He gave to his "ten servants...ten pounds" for trading (a pound was worth \$25).

Note

The number 10 speaks of responsibility according to ability. We have 10 fingers to work efficiently and 10 toes to walk uprightly.

The 10 pounds represent the Word of God (Bible) and spiritual gifts. God gives us spiritual goods. He furnishes the capital, and He wants us to use it according to our abilities. Scattering God's Word (Bible) of God will bring returns to us.

The **hating citizens** [Luk.19:14] refer to Christ-rejecting Jews.

Note

Note the difference in the gain of these servants from that of the talent! Here different amounts of percentage are seen. Both servants with the talents gained 100%; but the 1^{st} servant to whom the pound was given gained 1,000%, while the 2^{nd} servant gained 500%.

The **napkin of the indolent** figures pleasure and comfort. His pound was given to the one that had 10 pounds.

"Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life."
